



Secret stories – puzzle pictures

☞ [...] It [is] perhaps most productive to simply believe that the things you deal with have a certain value. It's not about trying to prove to others that they are important; it's enough to know yourself that they are. (1)

THINK

What's on your mind?  
Are there any things that have special meaning for you?  
Are you perhaps sometimes a mystery to yourself or others?  
How can you express your personality?

☞ It's a really nice experience to see what basically connects all of these things. [...] It's a real puzzle, but it's my puzzle, and it's great to be able to put all these elements together and thus perhaps solve the mystery. (2)

▷ Collect objects, symbols, signs, texts, pictures that have something to do with you or that interest you. Use them to make a picture and thus create your own secret story. You can draw, paint, or work with collage – there are no limits to your own personal puzzle picture!

▷ Present your picture to the class. What symbols do your classmates understand without your explanation? Where do they need a hint from you? Which elements of the picture should remain your secret, a riddle?

✿ Work in pairs to create a secret story together!

Or can (picture) puzzles be solved without explanations by their creators?
